MINUTES:

Motion was made by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Shields, and carried, that the Minutes of the Board Meeting of October 19, 1970, be approved as written.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Motion was made by Mr. Blastock, seconded by Mr. Shields, that the October Report of the Treasurer be approved and accepted as submitted.

MOTION carried.

BILLS PAID, FUND TRANSFERS APPROVED, PAYROLLS ACKNOWLEDGED: Upon MOTION by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Blastock, the Board approved for payment October bills Lotalling \$43,865.91, fund transfers of \$8,436.27, and acknowledged the October payrolls: regular \$85,516.10, work-study \$11,177.10.

PERSONNEL EMPLOYED: Dr. Taylor recommended the employment of Mrs. Judith Roberts as

Director of our RN Program at \$1,000.00 per month starting with November,

1970.

Upon MOTION by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Garrabrandt, the Board concurred in the recommendation.

TRUSTEE ELECTION: RESOLUTION RE: DATE: Upon MOTION by Mr. Blastock, seconded by Mr. Evans, the Board adopted the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Section 33-2106 Idaho Code provides that elections of Trustees for Junior College District in Idaho shall be held biennially in even-

numbered years, and on such uniform day of such uniform month as the Board of Trustees shall determine; and,

WHEREAS, the 1966 and 1968 Elections of Trustees for the College of Southern Idaho Junior College District were held on the third Tuesday of December of each of those years; and,

WHEREAS, the third Tuesday of December appears to be a convenient and proper time for said elections;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that, commencing with said election for 1970, Elections for Trustees of the College of Southern Idaho Junior College District shall be held on the third Tuesday of December on even-numbered years.

RE: 1970 TRUSTEE ELECTION: The Board reviewed the particulars of this election which will occur on December 15, and is in agreement that judges of election shall be paid \$12.00 each, plus mileage for the one who brings the supplies back to the CSI office; and that if necessary a \$10.00 fee may be paid for space for polling places in non-public buildings.

NEILSEN & MILLER REQUEST TIME EXTENSION: Dr. Taylor told the Board that Neilsen & Miller Construction Co., prime contractor for Phase 3, has requested a 32-day extension of time for substantial completion of the contract on the Multi-Use Building and Residence Hall. The request is based on the fact of a 12-day strike by the glaziers, and a 20-day delay on delivery of acoustical tile because of difficulties at the factory.

A MOTION was made by Mr. Blastock, seconded by Mr. Garrabrandt, and carried, that the Board of Trustees of the College of Southern Idaho Junior College District grant the request of Neilsen & Miller Construction Co. and extend the time for substantial completion of Phase 3 construction thirty-two (32) days from November 26, 1970.

ENCYCLOPAEDIA BRITANNICA - MICRO BOOKS: College of Southern Idaho Director of Libraries has proposed that the College avail itself, for its Library, of a 20,000 volume Library of American Civilization in microbook. A full 750 page volume is on a single 3x5 microfiche card.

The purchase price, under an introductory pre-publication offer, is \$21,500. The alternative to an outright purchase is a 5-year lease arrangement, which may be terminated at the end of any anniversary, at a monthly rental of \$375.00. If the lease runs its full course of 60 months at \$375 per month, the full set of microbooks mentioned above becomes the property of the College. The microfilmed books may be read by use of a \$135.00 reader. The lease period is proposed to start as of November, 1970.

Dr. Taylor recommended that the College enter into the proposed lease agreement.

Thereupon a MOTION was made by Mr. Garrabrandt, seconded by Mr. Blastock, that the College of Southern Idaho enter into a lease-purchase arrangement

as hereinabove proposed, subject to termination at any anniversary date of the agreement.

Being put to a vote, the motion was declared carried.

- EDUCATIONAL TV: Dr. Taylor informed the Board that many of the details for acquisition of KBOI Channel 13 TV by the College have been worked out. KMVT has been sold. Federal funds are available, three to one of local funds. Vocational education could be the prime user of Channel 13 if acquisition is accomplished.
- FOOD SERVICE FOR CSI; SAGA CHOSEN: Dr. Taylor reviewed details of food service contracts which have been offered to the College; he recommended the Saga proposal be accepted and the contract awarded to it.

Upon MOTION by Mr. Evans, seconded by Mr. Blastock, the Board of Trustees accepted the proposal made by Saga for the food services concession to be conducted in the CSI Student Union Building effective on or about January 1, 1971, and authorized the entering into of a contract with Saga for the desired food service; that said contract shall be for a one-year period subject to renewal from year to year.

ROOM AND BOARD SCHEDULE AND FEES: A schedule of room and board fees for residency in the new CSI Dormitory and board in the new Student Union Dining Facilities was submitted by Dr. Taylor along with some comparisons with other colleges.

Upon MOTION of Mr. Blastock, seconded by Mr. Evans, and carried, the Board ok'd the following fee schedule on room and board for the 1971 spring semester:

- CONSTRUCTION PROGRESS REPORT: Dr. Taylor indicated pleasure in what he sees in the new buildings the College is getting, even though construction on Phase 3 is behind schedule. He said it appears systems balancing may start in a week or ten days; this procedure takes about two weeks.
- LEGISLATORS AND BOARD OF REGENTS: December 18 is the date set for a legislative luncheon at the Holiday Inn in Twin Falls, in which Area Legislators are being invited to join with the Board of Regents in an examination of legislative needs for Higher Education.
- ATTORNEY ALEXANDER: He reported the Court has denied the William Anderson claim.
- TRUSTEE DELEGATE TO AAJC MEET IN WASHINGTON, DC.: Upon MOTION by Mr. Blastock, seconded by Mr. Shields, Trustee John Garrabrandt was named as official delegate of the College of Southern Idaho to the annual meeting of the AAJC next February 28 thru March 6, 19/1, in Washington, D. C.

Voting on the Motion was: Blastock, Shields, Garrabrandt--YES; Evans and Coleman--NO.

Dr. Taylor will also be attending this meeting.

- HUD BOND SALE: It was noted the Bond Sale is currently scheduled for November 24 in Portland.
- NORTHWEST AJC MEETING IN PORTLAND: Upon MOTION by Mr. Garrabrandt, seconded by Mr. Evans,
 Dr. Taylor was authorized to attend the Regional Meeting of NWAJC in
 Portland in early December.
- AUDIT REVIEW, DECEMBER 1: The Board scheduled a special meeting for Tuesday, December 1 at 12:00 noon in the Holiday Inn to review the 1970 FY Audit Report by J. Robert Tullis.
