MINUTES OF SEPTEMBER 20, 1993, were approved as written on MOTION by Bill Babcock. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

TREASURERS REPORT: Acceptance of the Treasurer's report was approved on MOTION by Dr. Thad Scholes. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

BIDS:

1. The Board accepted the bid for an HVAC system for the Center for New Directions from Magic Valley Refrigeration of Twin Falls in the amount of \$14,150.00 on MOTION by Dr. Thad Scholes. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

The source of funding for the purchase is the Plant Facility Fund.

2. The Board accepted the bid for electrical supplies for the Center for New Directions from Platt Electric of Twin Falls in the amount of \$6,132 on MOTION by Dr. Thad Scholes. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

The source of the funding for the purchase is the Plant Facility Fund.

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3. There were two bids submitted for plumbing supplies from local vendors. The vendors interpreted the specifications differently resulting in a difference in the quality and price of the supplies. Based upon the good faith efforts of both bidders to supply the College with quality materials, the Board was requested to allow a re-bid of the supplies based upon name brand materials.

Both bids were less than \$4,000 and well below the

\$10,000 formal bid minimum.

The Board approved the re-bid on MOTION by Dr. Thad Scholes. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

- 1. The Board discussed the Fy 93 audit report. The administration and staff were commended for the positive trends shown in cost control and budget management. The audit was accepted on MOTION by Bill Babcock. Affirmative vote was unanimous.
- 2. Dr. Karine Siplon reported on the Registered Nursing and Practical Nursing programs. Both are filled to capacity with waiting lists. Admission to the programs is based upon a point system.

With the limited space in the programs and the number of out of state students the nursing programs attract, rejected applicants are often dissatisfied to learn that a

position was given to an out of state student.

Dr. Siplon requested guidance from the Board concerning two issues in the limited enrollment programs:

1. Do we limit out of state students?

2. Do we give priority in the selection process to students who take course work at the College of Southern Idaho?

Robert Alexander, College Attorney, advised the Board that they could not legally discriminate against out of state students.

The President and the Board agreed to take Dr. Siplon's concerns under advisement.

3. Third year activities are being offered this semester in the University of Idaho Agricultural program at the College of Southern Idaho. A four year Bachelor of Science degree in General Agriculture is being developed.

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4. The President reported that the College of Southern Idaho had the most stringent alcohol policy among public institutions of higher education. He pointed out that illegal consumption of alcohol was against State Board of Education policy but that legal consumption was not prohibited on college campuses.

The President and Board reaffirmed the current College

of Southern Idaho policy of no alcohol on campus.

5. The President reported the following:

a. The library project was listed as fifth on the State Board of Education capital projects list. There are some preliminary indications that the library may be funded from the Fy 93 State General Fund surplus.

b. The State Board of Education adopted a residency policy for the colleges and universities. Community college residency is determined by a separate section of Idaho Code.

c. The State Board of Education is conducting a faculty productivity study. Classroom time, curriculum development and advising are to be addressed. Outcomes assessment may also be worked into the study.

MISCELLANEOUS RULES THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

000.-- 099. (RESERVED).

- 100. POSSESSION, CONSUMPTION, AND SALE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES AT PUBLIC HIGHER EDUCATION INSTITUTIONS. Illegal possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages is prohibited in college or university-owned, leased, or operated facilities and on campus grounds. (7-1-93)
- 01. General Use Areas. Alcoholic beverages may not be possessed or consumed under any circumstances in areas open to and most commonly used by the general public. These areas include, but are not limited to, lounges, student union buildings, recreation rooms, conference rooms, athletic facilities, and other public areas of college or university-owned buildings or grounds.

- 02. Sale. Sale of alcoholic beverages is prohibited in college or university-owned, leased, or operated facilities and on campus grounds. (7-1-93)
- 03. Sanctions. Students who violate this policy will be subject to sanctions established by institutional administration. (7-1-93)
- 04. Guests and Visitors. Guests or visitors must observe these regulations while on campus or other college or university property. Non-compliance may subject a person to sanctions imposed by the college or university, as well as to the provisions of local and state law. (7-1-93)
