3. This machine will replace the two Xerox 1075 copy machines that we are currently lease/purchasing in the amount of \$2,300 per month. The two 1075's are to be traded in on the new 1090.

Minutes of 8:30 a.m. May 16, 1996 Meeting at Herrett Center

Present: Bryan Freeman, Jim Woods, Lynn Beck, Rick Greenwald, Dick Sterling, Nick Peterson, Bob Ireland, Mike Mason and John Perez

It was agreed upon to take the following action concerning the vapor barrier problem in the planetarium:

- 1. The main beams will be fire taped with an adhesive fire taping product during the repair process. The areas where the sheet rock overlaps will not be fire taped.
- 2. The entire ceiling will have new vapor barrier installed on the inside between the sheet rock and the noise insulation.
- 3. Nick Peterson will work with Bryan Freeman, John Perez and Lynn Beck to design a scaffolding system to work above the dome. It appears that we will attempt to suspend the scaffold above the dome from part to the structural roof steel. This is still being investigated.
- 4. There are approximately nine speakers that will be in the way of the scaffolding. They weigh several hundred pounds and must be placed in precise locations. The speakers will have to be taken down and re-installed by Skyscan at an estimated cost of approximately \$7,000.
- 5. All costs for the removal and re-installation of the speakers will be paid for by the contractor. All material, labor and scafolding costs will also be paid by the contractor.
- 6. Skyscan estimates that it will take about three days to remove the speakers and three days to re-install them.
- 7. We can shut down for two weeks for maintenance between September 1 and September 15th. If we have to allocate three days on each end to install the speakers, this will only leave us eight days to:
- a. remove projectors and miscellaneous equipment
- b. seal the dome with one layer of visqueen and one layer of canvas or suitable heavy material
- set up the scaffolding
- d. remove the sound insulation
- e. install the vapor barrier
- f. put the sound insulation back up
- g. paint the sound insulation.
- h. remove the scaffolding
- i. remove the canvas and visqueen

j. clean the planetarium

k. re-install projectors and miscellaneous equipment

- 8. Bryan Freeman will provide the necessary number of people to complete the job in a safe and timely manner. CSI will provide Rick Greenwald and Nick Peterson to assist Skyscan in the removal and installation of the speakers. Ormond will provide Bob Ireland to assist in the project.
- 9. During the project the entire dome will be sealed along with the ladder to the catwalk. Entry and exit will be though the roof door.
- 10. On Monday, May 20, 1996 at 8:30 a.m. Nick Peterson will meet with John Perez to further examine the planetarium area and scaffolding ideas. Brian Freeman is considering sending a scaffolding manufacturing representative to the planetarium to see if he can assist.



The first six months of operations for the new Herrett Center have been very enlightening for the Herrett staff. We are learning how the many features of the new facility and complex equipment can be used as an educational tool to impact student and adult visitors. We would like to acknowledge the design efforts of ZGA Architects for providing us with a facility that has received numerous positive complements from visitors.

This report summarizes a few of the more important statistics that have been compiled during the first six months of operation. You will note a wide geographic range of school groups who participted in Herrett programs. Even though an actual "school show" was not offered this first period, we still enjoyed many visitors from public and private schools in the region. Our visitor statistics are in line with earlier predictions, though we have not had an opportunity to test the summer tourist market. To encourage use by visitors to our area, we solicited and received a \$15,000 Idaho Travel Council grant to secure advertising throughout the southern Idaho region. Signs have been installed on the freeway, and we have advertisements in a wide variety of publications including the AAA Tour Book, Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce Guide to Twin Falls, and the Official Idaho Travel Guide, among others. Many more tourist-oriented adds will appear this summer around the state.

The report includes information on the summer and fall schedule and a list of upcoming shows with a brief description of each forthcoming production. Please note that in response to a heavy demand for holiday shows, we have adjusted our upcoming holiday schedule to include more showings and a special holiday presentation *Season of Light*. New museum exhibits will be coming this next year, dates and titles are provided. The final section of this report summarizes a few minor problems that we have either taken care of or are in the process or resolving.

We are very pleased with the results of the first six months of operation and look forward to an active tourist summer and very busy fall and holiday season. Most importantly, the entire staff of the Herrett Center wishes to thank the CSI Board of Trustees, CSI Foundation, and CSI Administration for three years of support and dedication to soliciting funds to allow construction of the new Herrett Center for Arts and Science.

A SUMMARY OF ISSUES IN NEED OF EVENTUAL RESOLVE

There is a vapor leak above the dome in the planetarium. A plastic vapor barrier was inadvertently ommitted during construction. This is a potentially serious problem but Ormond has proposed a solution that will require a two-week closure in early September.

We have heard comments from visitors that planetarium shows should change more frequently. To help increase the turn-around time on planetarium shows, we were given a full-time Planetarium Production Specialist, Chris Anderson. Addition of this position has already had a significant impact on our production schedule. By the next holiday season, we will be featuring four shows running concurrently through the week.

We have heard comments from visitors who think the planetarium should feature more traditional "star shows" and not shows like *Innerspace* and *Through the Eyes of Hubble*.

We have had numerous requests for "special group rates" for planetarium tickets sold to church groups, scout groups, etc. We are not recommending this because of the logistics of another pricing category (currently have adult (\$4), senior citizen (\$3), and student (\$2) plus special pricing for school groups (\$1.50).
