The above organization was approved on MOTION by Donna Brizee. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

2. Mary Beth Crane made a presentation concerning health insurance for students traveling on college sponsored foreign trips. She stated that colleges she contacted required students to have health insurance and to be made aware of repatriation insurance.

College attorney Robert Alexander recommended that the college require all students traveling on foreign trips to obtain personal health insurance.

Ms. Crane also noted that most schools require a waiver of liability form that has to be signed by the student. The Board directed Robert Alexander to develop a suitable waiver of liability form to be signed by students prior to departing on student trips.

The administration is to develop a formal application process for trips that will insure that the proper precautions have been taken. The Board directed that no foreign trip be taken to an area that was not recommended by the United States State Department.

Mike Mason was directed to look into the cost of providing workman's compensation insurance for faculty taking students on trips. Repatriation insurance is also to be investigated.

3. Dr. Joan Edwards and Char Hagemann explained the college's Albertson's Foundation grant. The grant is for implementing a program for both four-year teaching majors and two-year certificate students. The grant is for up to \$300,000 per year for three years.

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4. The President reviewed the Governors fiscal year 2000 budget recommendation to the legislature. He noted that the college was recommended for a 5.5% increase while other institutions were recommended for 3% to 4% increases.

The President also noted that, due to enrollment increases, 15% of the students in their first two years of college in the state go to the College of Southern Idaho.

5. The President announced that Arlen Crouch donated 128 acres south of the Interstate 84 exchange to the college. The Board expressed their appreciation for the donation.

RE: Survey of Health Insurance Requirements

As you requested, I surveyed some colleges and universities in the Northwest to find out how they handled health issues for students going abroad on study trips supported by their schools. Faculty and/or directors of international programs from 20 schools responded: the list of individual colleges follows at the end of this memo.

Results: All the colleges surveyed either had in place or were developing a protocol that provided uniformity of health care for all study abroad trips and that covered emergency procedures. All had or were in the process of setting up a central office for coordination of study abroad trips.

Of the colleges that host student study abroad either formally or informally, every college requires proof of student health insurance before the student leaves the country. If the college offers a student health insurance program, students must purchase it or certify that they are covered on their parents' health plan.

Additionally, a few colleges require that students participate in an "evacuation/repatriation" group insurance, which covers expenses in case a student must return home for medical treatment or in case a body must be returned from abroad. Most, however, simply alert students that this kind of insurance exists, and a few recommend students purchase it. All schools require students to "check off" that they have been given the information.

Re: CSI Students Foreign Travel Guidelines

DATE: January 16, 1999

As you know, CSI faculty advisors for overseas trips are already doing many of the actions recommended below. However, some of the recommendations include actions not being done that should be considered for future CSI trips.

The following recommendations for guidelines for CSI travel are taken or adapted from the National Association for Foreign Student Affairs "Guidelines for Responsible Study Abroad: Health and Safety". In this memo I concentrated on offering recommendations for health and safety since I felt those were your areas of concern.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. That CSI create an "assumption of risk and release statement" such as the one used by Ricks College (copy attached).
- 2. That both faculty and students be required to have appropriate health and travel accident (emergency evacuation, repatriation) insurance.
- 3. That faculty advisors conduct appropriate inquiry regarding the potential health and safety risks of the places to be visited.
- 4. That faculty advisors conduct appropriate inquiry regarding available medical services in the countries to be visited.
- 5. That faculty advisors provide clear information to students so they and their parents/guardians/families will have adequate information concerning preparation for, participation in and behavior while on the trip.
- 6. That faculty advisors provide orientation (either a course or required meetings) to trip participants, prior to leaving and while on-site. Information might include expenses for the trip, customs and courtesies, exchange rates for currency, safety, health, legal, political and environmental issues, basic helpful phrases in the language of the countries to be visited, etc.
- 7. That faculty advisors inform participants what constitutes appropriate behavior while on the trip, the consequences for non-compliance, and take appropriate action when aware that participants are in violation of appropriate behavior standards.
- 8. That faculty advisors conduct a participant screening process which would include the health of potential participants, their disciplinary history, and other factors that could impact on the trip.
- 9. That faculty advisors provide information for trip participants and their parents/guardians/families regarding when and where CSI's responsibility ends, and the range of participants' out-of-country experiences that are beyond CSI's (the program sponsor) control. In particular, program sponsors generally:
 - a. Cannot guarantee or assure the safely of participants or eliminate all risks from the study abroad environments.
 - b. Cannot monitor or control all of the daily personal decisions, choices and activities of individual participants.

c. Cannot prevent participants from engaging in illegal, dangerous or unwise activities.

- d. Cannot assure that US standards of due process apply in overseas legal proceedings or provide or pay for legal representation for participants.
- e. Cannot assume responsibility for the actions of persons not employed or otherwise engaged by the program sponsor, for events that are not part of the program or that are beyond the control of the sponsor and its subcontractors, or for situations that may arise due to the failure of a participant to disclose pertinent information.
- 10. That all trip participants be made aware of their responsibilities and that they (participants) can have a major impact on their own health and safety abroad through the decisions they make before and during the program and by their day-to-day choices and behaviors.
- 11. That the responsibilities of trip participants be defined. (Note: The National Association of Foreign Student Affairs provides a list of responsibilities for program (trip) participants.)
- 12. That faculty advisors provide the CSI Administration with an itinerary, names of trip participants and their local points of contact.
- 13. That CSI consider publishing a set of guidelines that would apply to all CSI sponsored out-of-country trips.

ASSUMPTION OF RISK AND RELEASE AGREEMENT

Knowing the risks, and in consideration for being permitted to participate, and as inducement to Ricks College to permit me to participate in this tour, I hereby, for myself, my heirs, executors, administrators, or anyone else who might claim on my behalf, covenant not to sue and waive, release, and discharge Ricks College, its agents, officers, and employees from any and all claims or liability for death, personal injury or property damage of any kind or nature, and any other claims whatsoever arising out of or in any way connected with my participation in this tour, even though liability may arise out of carelessness on the part of Ricks College, including its officers and employees.

This release extends to all claims of every kind or nature whatsoever, foreseen or unforeseen, known or unknown.

MY SIGNATURE BELOW AFFIRMS THAT I HAVE CAREFULLY READ THIS ASSUMPTION OF RISK AND RELEASE AGREEMENT AND THE OTHER TERMS; I UNDERSTAND ITS CONTENT AND PURPOSES, AND I VOLUNTARILY AGREE TO ALL THE TERMS SET FORTH ABOVE.
