MINUTES OF AUGUST 20, 2001, were approved as written on MOTION by Dr. Thad Scholes. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

TREASURER'S REPORT: The Treasurer's Report was approved on MOTION by Bill Babcock. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

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PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

1. The Board approved the leasing of busses from Trans IV by the college on MOTION by Bill Babcock. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

To comply with federal regulations, the college will lease the bus and pay the driver from college non-federal funds. The Board expressed intent that use of the Trans IV bus would be optional for short trips replacing a single van but mandatory for trips requiring two vans.

2. Dr. Curtis Eaton outlined operational aspects of the Office of Planning and Development. He reviewed the current assets of the foundation and the current status of investments. Deb Wilson gave examples of major gifts received by the foundation.

Bob Seibel, College of Southern Idaho Foundation President, reviewed efforts to build relationships in the Wood River Valley.

3. Graydon Stanley introduced the officers of the Associated Students of the College of Southern Idaho. They are Matt Krumm - President, James Logan - Vice President, Bridget VanDerwalker - Secretary and Amanda Atwood - Treasurer.

Graydon Stanley reviewed recent activities of the student senate and noted that we now have fifty-five active student clubs and organizations.

4. Mike Mason reviewed the impact of the two percent holdback of state funds. This amounts to approximately \$200,000 for academic programs and \$100,000 for the technical division. In response to the holdback the college plans to evaluate any position that becomes vacant, defer some planned maintenance until next year and review capital outlay purchases on a case by case basis to determine if some items can be delayed until next year.

The President noted that we could face additional holdbacks this year. An additional two to four percent holdback may follow the original two percent holdback.

Dr. Thad Scholes moved to direct the administration to review all college programs and operations for cost savings that will not negatively impact students. Affirmative vote was unanimous.

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5. Dr. DeVere Burton reviewed technical programs with the Board. He noted the importance of capacity building dollars and stated that we had a twenty-three percent increase in headcount this year.

Dr. Jerry Beck noted that every academic department showed increases. Faculty made an effort to not turn students away and to work them into existing classes. Over two hundred classes were reopened to accommodate students.

Dr. Beck thanked Ron Shopbell for his efforts in getting dual credit students into the system.

6. The President thanked the students for their work on the student survey and the prayer session for the victims of the World Trade Center terrorist attack. He also discussed:

Training completed by our Security Officers.

Proposal for an Army ROTC program.

Effect of the terrorist attach on campus.

State Board of Education meeting.

Groundbreaking for Fine Arts Addition.

Re: Bus Operations

The attached spreadsheets outline some options concerning the costs of operating busses, leasing or contracting for bus services. It appears that contracting for long trips and leasing a bus from Trans IV by the hour for shorter trips may be the most economical method of providing transportation.

Leasing 22 passenger busses will still be more expensive that operating the 15 passenger vans with our existing staff. The busses are safer and the bus drivers are subject to more training and regulations than our van drivers.

The contracted busses are larger, have restrooms and operate nearly as efficient as the 22-passenger bus on long trips while carrying more passengers. For basketball, we put both teams on a 44-passenger bus.

The primary reason vans are utilized extensively by our programs is that they are virtually free. There are no interdepartmental charges to cover the operation or replacement of vans and existing staff operate them.

Moving to a system of charging for transportation will be difficult unless additional costs are built into budgets and we eliminate the use of the vans at no cost to the programs.
