Information Items

- 1. Executive Director for Facilities and Maintenance Spencer Cutler presented a report on the Canyon Building repair efforts that resulted from a storm.
- Director of Admissions Maritza Vega and Director of Student Access and Outreach Justin Nukaya presented an update on the Office of Admissions. Their presentation focused on the multiple ways their staff work to recruit and support entering students, including Instant Enrollment Events.
- 3. Dean of Career and Technical Education Dr. Barry Pate and Grant Marketing Operations Manager Shalani May presented information regarding CSI's participation in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) NextGen Program. In the first year, the grant supported 164 students with scholarships, housing stipends, and other support services.
- 4. Vice President of Instruction Tiffany Seeley-Case provided an overview of activities for the new academic year, including the onboarding of eleven new faculty, launching new efforts in engineering technology related career paths, and establishing new partnership opportunities with transfer partners. She also discussed ongoing work in the area of culturally responsive pedagogy.
- 5. Vice President for Institutional Effectiveness and Operations Chris Bragg presented the 2023-24 Annual Enrollment report. CSI saw a 9.3% increase in credit hours compared to the previous year.
- 6. Vice President Bragg also presented CSI's Annual Performance Measure Report. The report will be submitted to both the Idaho State Board of Education and to the Idaho Division of Financial Management.
- 7. Chair Anna Scholes presented the Board with a copy of the Bylaws to ensure that no further changes needed to be made. No changes were identified.



Financial - EHS Budget, Supplies category is overspent by \$22,132.45 that was the cost of starting the 2 new EHS classrooms in Hansen and American Falls. The Head Start supplies budget is underspent, so there is no concern.

Vehicle Disposition Approval – The Transportation Coordinator retired in July and with the move to full day services the program is no longer providing transportation services. As most of you know transportation has been reduced over the last six years as we moved classrooms to full day. Last year only two classes were transported. All old buses have been sold at auction, but we still own three newer buses. I would like to keep one bus for field trips. There are several employees with CDL's that can drive the bus for those outings. The other two buses I am seeking approval to transfer to the Friends of Children Head Start Program in Boise, they still provide some transportation services. At auction the buses would be sold well below market value, I believe that transferring the buses to another program is the best use of federal funds.

Head Start Enrollment

Since 1965, Head Start has been preparing children for Kindergarten and helping them develop the skills to become life-long learners. The program serves children in low-income families and children with diagnosed disabilities in the areas of school readiness, nutrition, medical, social and emotional services through class-time and home visits. The College of Southern Idaho Head Start program is funded to serve up to 469 children in nine counties from August to May.

Head Start modified enrollment at 80% of funded slots with an 81% monthly average attendance rate. Reduced enrollment was due mainly to staff shortages during the 2023-2024 Program Year. There were 32 children that received Special Education or Early Intervention Services.

Early Head Start Enrollment


Early Head Start has served low-income infants, toddlers, pregnant women and their families since 1994. College of Southern Idaho Early Head Start program provides families with the opportunity to enhance their infant or toddler's physical development, problem solving abilities, social and emotional skills. The program helps pregnant women obtain prenatal and post-partum care, as well as, families with infants and/or toddlers access to comprehensive health services. CSI Early Head Start provides services for 92 infants, toddlers and pregnant women year-round in Twin Falls, American Falls, Rupert and Jerome.

The Early Head Start program served 82% of the funded enrollment of infants, toddlers, and pre-natal mothers during the 2023-2024 program year. EHS operated at modified enrollment mainly due to staff shortages.

Children's Services

The College of Southern Idaho Head Start/Early Head Start program utilizes the High Scope curriculum, Child Observation Record (COR) and the Infant/Toddler Child Observation Record to measure developmental milestones, kindergarten preparedness and overall school readiness for children ages 0-5 in skill development.



Health Services


The philosophy of CSI Head Start/ Early Head Start health services is to prevent health issues whenever possible by carefully addressing the needs of enrolled children. Collaborative partnerships are the key to the success of this approach. When conditions or illnesses are found, they are addressed quickly with the help of competent health care partners in an effort to improve the health of the child and to prevent future problems.

Some services that the program provides include:

- Assisting families in finding a medical home and dental home.
- Locating sources of funding for health services, such as Medicaid or other community resources.
- Tracking health services such as well-child exams, dental and immunizations.
- Providing parents with information about well-child exams, screenings, trainings and information on child health development.

Child Nutrition

Head Start promotes child wellness by providing nutrition services and complement those in the home and in local community and cultural practices. Head Start's child nutrition services help families meet each child's nutrition needs and establish good eating habits that nurture healthy development.





Screenings

When a child enrolls in the program, steps are taken to assess the child's health and to identify any health concerns. The emphasis is on scheduling preventive and primary health care. The screenings also enables staff and partners to ensure prompt intervention to address problems. For example, it can identify children who need further assessment to determine if they need vision services or hearing aids, mental health services, special education and/or other related services.

Screenings completed within 45 days of Enrollment:

- · Vision
- · Hearing
- · Heights & Weight
- · Blood Pressure
- · Developmental
- · Speech & Language
- · Social & Emotional



Health Outcomes
